

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Greetings. It is with pleasure this time that my editorial gives me the opportunity to formally welcome our new President Dr Daryl Deering and provide you

with her summary of her work as a nurse. It is with pride I tell you she hails from Canterbury (and there is nothing one eyed about that!)

Daryle is of Scottish and Irish descent on her mother's side (Howison, Kinley) and Welsh and English descent on my father's side (Evans, Clark). She was born in Otautahi/Christchurch. Daryle has a long history of mental health connection having trained at Sunnyside Hospital back when Dame Margaret Bazely, who Daryle states had a significant influence on her nursing career, was the Principal Nurse. Daryle didn't stay in mental health but moved forward to train in general and obstetric nursing working for a period of time at Christchurch Hospital. However she has worked primarily in the mental health and ad-

diction sector – mainly community based services

e.g. community alcohol and drug, opioid substitution treatment, family mental health and specialist youth mental health.

Her roles have included clinical management and leadership. She was the Director of Mental Health Nursing for the Canterbury District Health Board from 2000-2007. Daryle states that whilst she has visited mental health and addiction services overseas she has never worked overseas but is looking forward to opportunities this year to visit Nurse Practitioners in the USA and the UK.

Academically, she completed a BA in nursing and psychology from Massey, then gained her Masters of Health Sciences and PhD from Otago University. Her research

has focussed on methadone treatment in New Zealand; client health related outcomes and consumer perceptions. Daryle currently works as a Senior Lecturer within the interdisciplinary National Addiction Centre at the University of Otago, Christchurch. The co-ordination of a national, post-graduate interdisciplinary paper on the treatment for people with co-existing substance use and mental health problems has been part of this role. Mental health nurses comprise a significant number of students.

She continues to be a member of the Drug and Alcohol Nurses of Australasia and over a number of years has supported the development of advanced nursing practice roles within the addiction treatment sector. These role developments are seen as essential given the "norm" of people experiencing co-existing substance use and mental health problems. Her current clinical work is with people with alcohol dependence and depression as part of a New Zealand wide research study, and provision of clinical supervision for mental health nurses.

Daryle states she stood for the role of President in order to support the continuation of the excellent work of Heather Casey and National Committee, Māori Caucus and the Boards as well as the continuing development of local Branches. In highlighting the challenges and opportunities for mental health nursing over the next few years she states a commitment to supporting mental health nurses and contributing to strategically strengthening mental health nursing with a focus on looking to the future. She believes that the College has a primary role in the future of mental health nursing in Aotearoa/New Zealand through continuing to develop a strong and active membership and voice for mental health nursing, collaborative working and partnerships with other nursing and interdisciplinary bodies, consumers, and a range of other networks.

PRESIDENTS COMMENT

With the support of National Committee and Heather in her *Immediate Past President* role I have commenced my role as President. I acknowledge the input of Sandy Smith and Tio Sewell (Secretary Maori Caucus) and miss them as National Committee members but also know that they join a growing group of College leaders. I welcome getting to know and work with Rawiri Emerson (Secretary Maori Caucus), David Warrington (Secretary National Committee) and Anne McDonald. They will be profiled in future newsletters. I welcome Dr Marie Crowe as Chair of the Education Board and look forward to new members joining the Research and Education Boards. NB applications are still being sought.

Key projects in process are the development of the Credentialing and Accreditation framework led by Heather, the review of the Standards led by the Practice Board with the first round of consultation due to occur in the next two – three months, and the review of the Strategic Plan. Other activities include the ongoing development of collaborative relationships with other nursing bodies, acknowledging the importance of a strong unified nursing voice while respecting the uniqueness of mental health nursing as a distinct area of nursing practice. As a College we have formally endorsed the Best Practice Recommendations from a Consumer Advisor Perspective on Mental Health Inpatient Units becoming "Smokefree and Metabolic monitoring for consumers of mental health services in New Zealand. A highlight for me in the past month was being invited by Colette Adrian (Chairperson, Auckland Branch) to participate in a Seminar with the broad theme of AOD is a public health issue.

At the end of the month I will be attending the Australian College of Mental Health Nurses conference in Tasmania with Hineroa and look forward to meeting other New Zealand nurses and including my impressions in the next newsletter.

Over the next year, National Committee will be supporting Branches to have a focus on recruitment. It is important for the College to have both a local and national focus in order to engage in a meaningful role for mental health nurses in practice settings. David (Warrington) will provide support to Branch Chairs and Denny McNae has been instrumental in developing a broader strategy.

We continue to have a small core of members who regularly attend the meetings, and are extremely privileged that our meetings are held during work time, supported by our CND. The 30 minute meeting is followed by a guest speaker, and the meeting is then opened as a "mental health nurses forum" to all nurses, branch members or not.

Branch members take responsibility for inviting a guest speaker to present topics interesting and relevant to nurses working within the mental health field. In the past year we have had presenter and topics such as: Professional Supervision, Indemnity Insurance, Te Pou and work force development, Refugee Liaison Nurse role, Police Liaison Nurse role, Waikato DHB GM and DONM, Sue Hayward, and Dr Mark Smith (RN) The discussions about indemnity were interesting, and some of our current members choose to belong to NZNO & the College.

While we have not attracted new members from this, it highlights branch members' interest in a wide range of topics.

Blue Messiah, by Peter Finlay. A Toi Ora Trust publication. \$24.50. 191pp. ISBN 978 0 473 16000 5

Thursday night at Allelujah Café, K Road, Auckland. A frail-looking man is sitting at a table, a stack of



newly minted books beside him. The man is Peter Finlay, and the book is *Blue Messiah*, Peter's account of his career as a mental patient in New Zealand's network of psychiatric services. Peter's story covers time in Tokanui, Lake Alice, Auckland's Connelly Unit, as well as in a range of community mental health programmes and accommodation services. But it is much more than a story about mental health services. Peter writes of his friendships, his family, his dreams, and his insatiable urge to write. *Blue Messiah* is a poignant memoir which has moments of sadness, frustration, exhilaration, and reflective wisdom. Peter has a wonderfully light touch as a writer. Despite the often tumultuous course of his life, and distressing encounters with mental health services, he never hectors the reader about how they must respond. Nurses might gasp at some of Peter's experiences, from his detention by police and time in Lake Alice to his more recent encounters with the optimistically

named Dr Love. But Peter leaves us to come to our own conclusions. There are some moments of dry, self deprecating humour, that make the ordered world of mental health care seem comical. After losing a jacket in a bet with Michael, who subsequently sold it to a pool shark, nurses intervened to restore Peter's property and thus maintain the ward rules that there should be no betting.

"I didn't like the sound of this, and with justification. It meant I'd have one angry pool shark on my back. Sure enough when I next saw him, even though he was locked up in the isolation cell, the pool shark was frothing at the lips to get me and beat my head in. He would not stand being ripped off in money matters, even small ones. So the head nurse became involved. She worked out an agreement favourable to Michael, with my help. I would pay the pool shark twenty dollars and Michael five. And Michael would pay me fifteen dollars. The jacket would remain in my hands. Michael was near broke at the time so I didn't think there was any chance of getting the full twenty dollars back. As it turned out, I didn't get anything back. When the pool shark heard about this he offered to forego his twenty dollars, but I, not wanting a misunderstanding to arise, insisted on paying him the full amount of what was owed. So I ended up forking out twenty dollars for my own jacket. Michael refused to cancel the bet, even though bets were not allowed to be made on the ward, probably because patients like me were too irresponsible."

Blue Messiah is the result of Peter's commitment to writing over the course of his life, finally fashioned through courses taken at the Toi Ora Live Art Trust. The Trust provides arts workshops to enable mental health consumers to develop their artistic potential in a safe, non-institutional environment. The book finishes on a hopeful note, with Peter concluding that "...the pain is muted now, with the help of sympathetic fellow adults. The hard days are over." Blue Messiah is a frank, clear-eyed account of a lifetime of mental health services. It provides more anecdotes than the night shift nursing office and more insight than a year on olanzapine.

World Suicide Prevention Day

10 September 2010

World Suicide Prevention Day on 10 September promotes worldwide commitment and action to prevent suicides. On average, almost 3000 people commit suicide daily. For every person who completes a suicide, 20 or more may attempt to end their lives.

With the sponsoring International Association for Suicide Prevention, WHO and other partners advocate for the prevention of suicidal behaviour, provision of adequate treatment and follow-up care for people who attempted suicide, as well as responsible reporting of suicides in the media.

At the global level, awareness needs to be raised that suicide is a major preventable cause of premature death. Governments need to develop policy frameworks for national suicide prevention strategies. At the local level, policy statements and research outcomes need to be translated into prevention programmes and activities in communities. "The Government continues to invest strongly in mental health with an extra \$174 million over the next four years," Health Minister Tony Ryall says.

"We are spending more on mental health than the previous Government ever did."

"Savings in the 2010 Budget account for less than half of one percent of the \$1.2 billion the Government spends on mental health each year."

"We have made savings from contracts that finished, from contracts where there was not sufficient uptake and from uncommitted money that has gone back into the health pot."

"None of these savings pose any risk to frontline services."

"This is all in the context of Labour quietly cutting more than \$100 million from the Health budget in the weeks leading up to the 2008 election."

"Several new and exciting mental health initiatives will be announced shortly."

"These are in addition to new initiatives announced last year such as \$26 million for eating disorder services."

"The bottom line is that we are spending more on mental health services and providing more services to the public than ever before."
